

ROBOT-PROOFING OUR STUDENTS

Northeastern University named its fastest-growing college the Khoury College of Computer and Information Sciences in honor of alumnus and trustee Amin Khoury, DMSB'89. Inspired by Northeastern's leadership in digital innovation, Khoury has endowed the college with \$50 million to support all aspects of the college's future focus.



FOSTERING DISCOVERY

Parents Sami Alsaif and Hend Dabbous, PNT'21, established the Alsaif Family Doctoral Fellowship in the College of Engineering, one of the first ever endowed at the university. Fellow Jennifer Rodowicz studies the effect of the internet of things on smart medical implants, while Vikrant Shah is creating autonomous robots for use in harsh arctic environments.



PUTTING INNOVATION IN MOTION

James Pallotta, MBA'81, and his family gave \$10 million to Northeastern for innovation initiatives they are planning in consultation with President Joseph E. Aoun. Pallotta, who founded the investment firm the Raptor Group and owns a controlling interest in the Italian soccer team A.S. Roma, wants to propel Northeastern's students to the forefront of innovation.



ELEVATING THE HUMANITIES

Ronald Rossetti, DMSB'66, H'06, and his wife, Linda, established the Rossetti Family Program for the Advancement of the Humanities and the Ronald L. and Linda A. Rossetti Chair for the Humanities at the College of Social Sciences and Humanities. The first incumbent, Associate Professor of Philosophy Rory Smead, will inspire STEM students to explore the liberal arts.
